COMET'S HALEY

Among the fields sweeping the outskirts of Sauk Centre, Minnesota, four Shires graze under the care of Gene Loxtercamp, a farmer and horseman well-known for his involvement with draft horses. He was committed to the Northern Minnesota Draft Horse Association, displaying the uses of antique horse-drawn equipment. Throughout this, he promoted the Shire horse breed and the way a former war horse helped write America's farm history. However, most importantly, Gene is my grandfather.

As one of the early Shire breeders in the Midwest, my grandpa raised numerous foals in my lifetime, and I grew up right alongside them. From the time I could walk, I was fearlessly wandering among these gentle giants, whose legs alone were taller than I was. My grandpa recognized my love for them and dedicated himself to cultivating it. At a young age, I was learning how to be safe around animals forty times my weight and being taught things such as feeding, grooming, and handling. I participated in everything from washing feather before our county fair to cleaning up after they'd left their stalls.

Through all this, I was particularly excited by the idea of riding. I watched my mom proudly parade the American flag through the fair's grandstand on grandpa's breathtaking mare, Heather. I wanted to experience that trust and connection with a horse so badly. I didn't have to wait long before I found myself astride Heather, who had always been my dream horse. This was quickly followed by driving lessons. Both grandpa and Heather displayed

an immense amount of patience while I learned by trial and error, of which there was plenty. I remember line driving her at the fair when, suddenly, I found myself face-to-face with a befuddled-looking Heather. I hadn't kept the correct tension on the lines, which essentially cut off communication between us. At that time, I had no idea how she would completely change my life.

Ten years ago, a meteor shower in connection with Halley's Comet decorated the sky overhead while Heather's last foal was born: the final addition to grandpa's herd. I was so young at the time, but remember being intrigued by him and tending to gravitate in his direction. The feeling was apparently mutual for Comet, who was named after the phenomenon that occurred the night he was born. He began to follow me like a puppy. My favorite story of grandpa's is about the time he ventured out to the horse pasture and saw me laying on the ground while the young Comet stood guard over me, both of us looking as content as could be. I had completely trusted him with my life; I had become Comet's Haley. This likely was the first of many developments that eventually led to grandpa encouraging me to work with Comet under saddle.

Despite grandpa's passion for draft horses in harness, he never failed to support my riding goals with Comet. From the start, Comet exhibited graceful gaits smoother than silk and was full of expression. For several years prior to riding him, I had been taking dressage lessons, and Comet showed potential in that direction as well. I learned that this was not entirely unusual for Shires. I hadn't yet been exposed to them in a competitive riding atmosphere and wasn't aware of their reputation regarding athleticism in the arena. It's astonishing to witness how much potential some Shires possess when they pair with the correct rider to channel it. They were also, as I'd experienced firsthand, known for being willing, hard-working partners. Comet showcases this trend well. He was so cooperative through the learning curve of many subtle aids and genuinely enjoyed the challenges provided by the work.

Once we'd gotten comfortable with the work, Comet and I attempted several small dressage shows. My trainer had convinced me that riding wasn't worthwhile unless I eventually proved myself in front of a panel of judges. I was driven to strive for per-

fection, even at the cost of the relationship I'd built with my best friend. While the lifestyle works for some, Comet and I did not fall into that category. I realized, much later than I should have, that this was a situation Comet and I needed to escape. The thought alone of galloping across an open field sounded like a breath of fresh air after heading down a path we had no interest in for so long. Rather than directing our energy towards performing, we rerouted it toward learning and experimenting, specifically with jumping.

If I'd thought Comet thrived in dressage work, it was nothing compared to the excitement he radiated when pointed at a jump. I had jumping experience in the past, however, there was a lot of learning involved; mostly on my end. Comet has a natural knack for the jumps. He's excellent at timing his strides and take-offs, as well as maintaining the correct lead. Grandpa fed off my excitement and helped me position logs across the wooded trails, like something out of a fairytale. His investment in how our rides were going meant everything to me, especially since Comet was a horse he'd specifically bred for driving.

Nowadays, Comet and I ride the woods in Northern Minnesota. Each day brings another adventure, some where we rocket across fields and others where we meander down old logging roads. We've developed a system based off of the example my grandpa set of equal effort and paying close attention to each other. He taught me the value of keep-

ing an open mind where I may be able to learn from others instead of strictly learning from my own mistakes. Outside perspectives can also help open doors I hadn't yet considered. It's becoming just as easy for us to hack around as it is for us to practice more structured concepts. I'm constantly inspired by Comet's refusal to be limited to one thing, and, like his mother, his ability to forgive while I learn alongside him. Six years ago, I never could have seen myself where I am today, and I never would have guessed how my selfless grandpa and his sweet mare would completely change my world.

Chapter 12: Recovery of the American Shire Horse Association

Please note: This work is an excerpt from a larger book with earlier installments in previous newsletters and is to be taken as the opinion of the author.

While the Bixby horses going to Idaho ensured enough genetic diversity to save the breed, interest in the American Shire Horse Association was not strong enough for it to survive as an organization, let alone maintain a breed registry. Following the

retirement of E.F. Fox as the ASHA secretary, Lawrence Krammer assumed the role, but at some point in the 1950's he seems to have stopped creating registration papers for owners though there is evidence that some were submitted to him. This is a vague area in the history of the ASHA because it is beyond the memory of current members and written records did not survive, nor was there any interest in recovering any of the information until it was almost too late.

Edwin Henken of Ferndale, Washington literally saved the physical copies of the breed registry and was instrumental in reviving the ASHA in the 1960's. He grew up in an agricultural area where draft horses were still in common use and has had a life-long love affair with them. Over the years Ed has told the story of how he went on a hunt in his youth to find out more about Shires at various ASHA events. Louise Reuble, a Shire breeder who served on the ASHA Board of Directors the first time in 1976, took her daughter Leandra to visit him in 2003 to hear the story firsthand. Leandra wrote the following based on her notes:

Ed Henken started hunting Shires for the same reason everyone else does: love for the breed. His quest for information turned into burning curiosity and developed into a crusade to do what was right; with the whole process being helped along with a healthy dose of good timing. He had grown up in an area where draft horses were not only shown, but still had everyday roles on family farms. Ed eventually purchased a 6-horse hitch of Clydesdales and bred and showed them throughout his life, but his knowledge of various draft breeds comes from years of experience in serving not only as the ASHA Secretary, but filling the same roles for the American Suffolk Horse Association and being active with the associations for Clydesdales.

My mother and I met with Ed in his home and my plan was to rely on her memory of resurrecting the ASHA to spur his, but he was so clear in his story that we both sat and listened with very few interruptions. He is a man of spare build who smiles a great deal behind his glasses and has an unaffected farmer personality. My father termed Ed a 'fine horseman;' high praise indeed. Ed's wife and son suffer horribly from allergies to animal dander, so their living room is sparse, their dogs are hypoallergenic giant schnauzers, and Ed cleans up in a separate bathroom with its own entrance to try to minimize his wife's exposure. One of his daughters-in-law is his primary help with the Clydes and he proudly showed us his new foal crop before settling down to the interview.

"I was alone and by myself so I decided to write to all five of the draft horse associations and start collecting information," said Ed. In 1958, at the tender age of 23, he was finishing up a tour in the Army and stationed in Kansas City, Missouri, working at the Regional Health Center to inspect water supplies and sewage systems for sanitation problems. This was a pretty big leap for someone raised in Lynden, Washington at his dad's general store.

"As I was growing up, I had become very enthused about the Draft Horses at the fair. [Whatcom County Fair] As a little kid

you used to be able to stand on the grandstand and there were the Draft Horses, and I was so enthralled with all that." he said, relishing the memory with a grin so broad his cheeks nearly covered his eyes.

Ed decided to take advantage of his location in the Heartland to do a little investigating and decide which breed he wanted to begin raising and showing for himself. His letters to the various associations yielded lists of breeders and their addresses, except for the American Shire Horse Association (ASHA). He received nothing but an irritating silence. The request had gone to an E.F. Fox in Des Moines, Iowa but there was no reply. Ed's inspection territory covered seven states, so when one of his tours took him in the general vicinity, he looked up the address and discovered an abandoned boarded up warehouse in the industrial section of the city.

In the meantime, Ed kept himself busy meeting people and looking at lots of horses from different breeds to see what people had, but the lack of Shires continued to niggle at him. He was also reminded every time he saw a sign for Fox Seeds; he knew it was the same Fox family. Ed visited Lester Good in Ogden, Iowa, whose claim to fame was having a grandfather who imported a Belgian stud in 1910 who Lester's father paid a whopping \$47,500 setting a record at the time. Lester's wife's family also handled Shires and Clydesdales. They were a great resource to Ed, who was still gathering general information on the various breeds.

According to Lester, Edward Fox, Sr., had died some years ago, but Edward Fox, Jr. was a diplomat working in foreign embassies around the world. No one was too sure what had happened to the American Shire Horse Association stud books or the membership list. Ed was frustrated, but let it go until on a return trip to Des Moines in March of 1959, Ed looked up Fox's phone number in the local phone book. "Talk about a divine hand in this whole thing, he just happened to be home. And he and his wife were going out for dinner so he really didn't have time to look up any new names then, but he said to give him my name and address and he'd send me the name and address of the man he'd given the Shire records to." said Ed. The trail was fresh again and Ed was eager to resume the hunt.

A few days later, Ed received a pre-printed postcard from the junior Fox that listed an address for the new association secretary, but no name: P.O. Box 10, Paulsville, Missouri. Ed's simple curiosity had turned to dogged determination so he went to the local library for a map to find the tiny town. "By this point I had visited with breeders from the four other associations, so I was wanting to get more familiar with the Shires and see what I could find out because they had been quite a popular breed at one time, then they just disappeared. It kind of stunned the imagination." said Ed.

Apparently, when Fox's father was terminally ill, he'd given all of the ASHA records to Lawrence Krammer, who was writing a book on the rise and demise of the Shire horse in America. Ed said that Fox's perspective was, "here is a young man very interested in all this, it looked like there was no future for the Shires, so he turned the records over to him." Lawrence Krammer had the stud books and the member list at one time and would surely know who they had been passed to. Ed was still trying to decide which breed of draft horse he wanted to pursue and was still trying to find out where Shires were located in the country. He could not very well buy one if he could not find them.

Ed had a friend who was a Suffolk breeder in Overly, Missouri, Orville Osch, who volunteered to help him find Paulsville. Ed's biggest lead was an add in the Belgian Review for Double Eagle Farms in Centralia, Missouri, ten miles from Paulsville, for stud services from a Belgian owned by Lawrence Krammer. Ed was still after a list of Shire breeders. "I figured, well, the guy who had the records must be a Draft Horse man. One Draft Horse man that close together would know the secretary because I had no name and the post office wouldn't tell me-I had to have another plan of attack."

After cruising along a lot of dirt roads with few street signs, Ed and Orville found the Double Eagle Farm. It consisted of a dirt farm with a few horses and a Belgian stud being housed in a two-car garage. A young man was plowing a field behind the house, so they flagged him down to get a few details. Turns out the farm was owned by Lawrence Krammer, an agricultural instructor at the University of Missouri, and the young man was one of his students. He knew exactly where the records were and took them to another farm owned by Krammer; he had helped Krammer load the Shire records in a horse trailer to store them in the vacant house on the property.

Ed's eyes filled with regret and remembered dismay when he explained that just the day before, Krammer and his assistant had held a huge bon fire and burned boxes of information. Ed was able to sift through the ashes and found what appeared to be two copies of the last published addition of the ASHA Newsletter. He said there was a photograph of a nice team of black Shire

Ed did eventually meet Lawrence Krammer, who turned out to be his own age and planning to go to Veterinary School in Aimes, Iowa. But Ed was content that he finally had the list of last known Shire breeders, gleaned from the last pages of the newsletter, and did not pursue anything at that point.

Then, while touring the Midwest after being released from the service in late July of 1959, Ed met one of the listed Shire breeders, Bob Davis. From Bob, Ed learned another significant piece to the puzzle of what had happened to the American Shire. Fred H. Bixby in Southern California had bought all of Bob's horses from him a few years previously when he replaced his herd with Clydsedales. Bixby was using them, and every other Shire he could get hold of for his five ranches, buying them sight unseen in an effort to protect the breed.

When automated horsepower replaced the need for the real thing, many breeders were forced out of the business for the same reason as Bob: there were no available Shires to breed to other then their own and no practical market for them. Many of those horses either went to the slaughterhouses or California and Bixby. He had the largest concentration of Shires in the country and most became lost in obscurity when Bixby died because there was no record of transfer.

"Unfortunately, what happened with the Shire breed, kind of piecing everything together, Bixby and Ed Fox...Ed was terminally ill and Bixby died, so everything kind of went to pot. Here you had hundreds of Shire horses that had congregated in California and they were just gone with no record of where." Ed's eyes were stark with emotion at the loss.

Ed returned home to Lynden in 1960 and attended the Whatcom County Fair in the early fall. Meanwhile, as Ed was on his hunt, Fred (Freddie) Polander, Jr. and Don Anderson (not related to the Mel Anderson family) had gone on a buying trip to Blackfoot, Idaho to look at a Clydesdale and Shire stud respectively. The Clyde was gone by the time they got there, but Don brought home F.H.B., a registered buckskin Shire stud. Don approached Ed at the fair, on the advice of Freddie, because he couldn't get the horse transferred into his name. Don also had two Shire mares purchased in Centralia, WA and couldn't get them registered either.

At first Ed didn't want any part of it, he had taken over as secretary for the Suffolk Association and was busy keeping their genealogy charts, but it's hard for Ed to turn anyone down. It sat and brewed in the back of Ed's mind and, when the 1961 fair rolled around and Don still wasn't getting any action, Ed volunteered to contact his old friend Lester Good.

"Lo and behold, within days after Lester Good had gotten my letter, Lawrence Krammer stops at the Good Farm, he is still writing his book on the Shire horse, and he wants to talk to them about old importations!" Ed said with a satisfied chuckle.

Lester agreed to work with Krammer if Krammer would contact Ed and start handling ASHA business. Krammer did eventually send Ed a letter and expressed his willingness to turn over the registration records. In the fall of 1962 Ed accepted a job to pick up a car in Chicago and drive it back to the coast. He traveled east by train, with a layover in Hannibal, MO to hold a National Suffolk Association Board Meeting in the kitchen of Orville Osch. Ed cruised out of Chicago in a big old Cadillac and made a pit stop for the sum total of the American Shire Horse Association boxes upon boxes stuffed with odds of paper.

"Okay, now what do I do?" Ed still shakes his head in disbelief at the utter chaos he inherited/demanded. "There were no stud books. The Suffolk books came to me in just beautiful shape, but this was just a bunch of loose paper with no organization."

Ed dug in and began sifting through paper. He created a new stud book, numbered the first horse as one, and began trying to track down the horses to fill the books. He wrote endless letters to the addresses he found, trying to track down what had happened to various horses. One response came from Elizabeth Bixby Janeway, one of Fred's daughters, who told him many of the horses had been sold to the Utah/Idaho area and suggested he check out the Eastern Idaho State Fair. Ed followed up on the lead with more letters to the eight Shire breeders who were supposed to be exhibiting there, but heard nothing back.

Ed was now producing a combined Suffolk/Shire Newsletter and mailing it seasonally to every address he had. The stud books were open and ready for names; he just needed a little cooperation to be able to fill them with horses. Ed announced in the newsletter that he would be coming to the Eastern Idaho State Fair and that he would handle any registering needs at that time. Ed was feeling discouraged and began to question whether it was worth it to keep after it because he still hadn't gotten any kind

of response. Then, he received a phone call from Glen Mason, a former horse trader now living in Tremonton, UT who offered to act as Ed's guide and take him on a tour of the Idaho mountains.

"Boy, that was the best thing I had heard of in the whole Shire effort at this point in time, so I packed up and drove all night Friday to get there and meet Glen." Ed arrived during the middle of the fair parade in town and nearly drove off the road when he finally caught sight of his quest in the flesh.

"Here came the hitches of Draft Horses and here came Shire horses! And I think there were three or four hitches of Shire horses that came through that parade. I was just flabbergasted. Nobody had written back or anything, and here were all these Shire horses. I was impressed." Ed's voice boomed out with his enthusiasm and brought his palms down on the arms of his chair with a solid thwack for emphasis.

It was September of 1962 and Ed met the families who still represent the foundation of the American Shire Horse: The Barney, The Birds, and The Morgans. Glen Mason did take Ed on a tour of the remote country, but they were unable to find any Shires, it had been too long since Glen's trading days. Ed sat in the stands of the fair and watched with breath held as the teamsters put their hitches through the paces. The horses were so well broke that if one horse put so much as a foot out, the team would be placed at the bottom of the class. These were men who worked their animals on a daily basis and lived with them and each other. What's better than beating your buddy out for a ribbon?

"They were in their own little world there. They didn't realize at that point, and I didn't either, the magnitude of what had happened-these truly were the last of the Shire horses in the country."

Vernon Bird and Alma Chaffin had gone down to one of the Bixby dispersal sales and bought two semi loads of horses. They primarily bought black with four white socks, and amidst the others, brought black three studs that were paternal brothers. They kept some of the horses and sold others to their neighbors. The general suspicion is that the horses who did not make it to Blackfoot made it instead to rending plants. Some of the horses had papers, but no one knew whom to contact to change the registered owners of the horses. Ed set up shop and went to work.

In 1962, at the Eastern Idaho State Fair in a tack room, with Ed acting as secretary, the American Shire Horse Association Board of Directors met for the first time in over fifteen years.

LIFE MEMBER WENDY DUNNING (1941-2021)

Wendy Dunning was born on December 18, 1947 in Salina, Kansas, and passed away on June 14, 2021.

Wendy was raised in the Fort Collins, Colorado area and graduated from Colorado State University in 1970 with a bachelor's degree in Physical Education and Dance.

She, along with sister Kathy, became involved with horses and got their first horse in 1959, and continued showing in American Quarter Horse Association events throughout college.

She was a CSU riding instructor and Horseman Judge that trained throughout Colorado and Wyoming. She took her reining mare Satin, and conducted horsemanship clinics, as well as training throughout the area. She also became Laramer County Fair and Rodeo Queen.

Wendy and Kathy were also involved with dancing; starting at three years old, and loved ballet, tap dancing, and square dancing, performing throughout Colorado and Wyoming.

Wendy married Gary Dunning on July 4th, 2000 by Pingree Park up the Poudre Canyon.

Wendy and Gary fell in love with the powerful yet gentle draft horses, and bought their first Shire mare, Wandamere Duchess Supreme, in 1986 from Willard and Ethel Stevens of Idaho.

They founded Rivendale Shires Draft Horse Farm, raising and breeding Registered Shire horses and Shire Sporthorses. They joined and became life time members of the American Shire Horse Association, and also became long time members of the Colorado Draft Horse Association, concentrating on showing, educating, and driving horses. Performing hay rides, parades, benefits, wedding, and funerals, became a part of their program.

Wendy and Gary became involved with Larimer County Santa Cops program in 1997, helping to deliver gifts to those in need with horses and wagon. They did this almost every year the Saturday before Christmas, only missing a few years. In 2009, along with the Colorado Draft Horse Association, became involved with the Hearts & Horses Therapeutic Riding Center giving rides to the disabled, and staff and family, and guest. That was every Sunday before Christmas.

Santa Cops and Hearts & Horses events became very dear to Wendy.

Wendy is survived by her husband of forty-one years, Gary, her sister Kathy Flinn, DL Weiser, Fritz Weiser, and Tracy Call.

Wendy's Celebration of Life was held on July 4th, 2021, at Hearts & Horses Therapeutic Riding Center, at 163 No. County Road 29, Loveland, Colorado, 80537.

Chaplain Bruce Rippe (a long and very dear friend) performed the service for Wendy.

Instead of flower arrangements, it was requested to bring plantable flowers or seeds so that a flower garden could be finished that Wendy was unable to complete.

Mt. Hope HPD: A Rich History With Shires

The 27th Annual Horse Progress Days was held July 2-3, 2021 at the Mt. Hope Auction & Event Center, in the heart of Holmes County, Ohio. Home to the world's largest Amish community, where farming is still done with horses.

Farming with horses is nothing new. From the beginning of time, horses were used to farm, pull heavy loads, and for travel. Many felt that horses would always be the only horsepower on farms around the nation, but by the end of WW II, the combustible engine had been invented, and then came the tractor.

First came the small tractors that pulled the same size implements as horses. And then the sizes of the tractors began to grow, and the size of tractor equipment grew alongside it. And horse farmers found it harder and harder to find new equipment to replace

equipment that was wearing out. The conventional wisdom had it that horse farming in the western world was gone.

The Amish continued their efforts using horses to farm, but was finding it difficult to find horse drawn equipment. With tractor equipment manufac-



turers abandoning production of horse drawn equipment, the Amish studied the equipment that their counterparts in the "modern" world were abandoning, and figured out ways to make it themselves.

Several horse drawn equipment manufacturers were born, designing and producing top

of the line equipment. Much of the equipment used by today's horse farmers is superior in its materials and design to that which was offered by John Deere and Cyrus McCormick back when they and others were pumping out piles of horse farming equipment.

The idea for Horse Progress Days was brewing in the minds of a few important draft horse people for some years before the first event was held in 1994. It didn't even have a name, it was just an idea. An idea to invite manufacturers of this new draft horse equipment and see if they would agree to bring their products to a central location where some well broke teams could work it in the fields and demonstrate it.

Today there are Amish communities in more states and provinces than at any previous time. The farms in these communities are all horse farms. Horse Progress Days is a representation of what is already happening every day on horse farms in North America. Anyone who is not

convinced of it only needs to attend Horse Progress Days and see it for themselves.

Horse Progress Days is rotated and held each year in an Amish community throughout the United States. Currently they are held in Southern Indiana, (2022) Northern Indiana, (2023) Pennsylvania, (2024) Michigan, (2025) Central Illinois, (2026) and Ohio (2027). Crowds for the first Horse Progress Days were in the 8-10,000 range, with the 2021 crowd close to 30,000 in attendance!

The Shire has been in attendance at Horse Progress Days in Mt. Hope, Ohio, since 2003, when Amish Shire breeder, Bill Troyer, of Millersburg, took his two stallions, Black Park Sensation (4) and Wandamere's Devon's Buddy (5) and did field demonstrations with a manure spreader. The next time HPD was held

in Mt. Hope was in 2008, and Buddy and Tom's picture pulling the manure spreader from 2003 graced the cover of the HPD catalog. This year in addition to the field demonstrations, the committee also added a Breed Parade.

Bill again took his Shires to represent the breed, including his two homebred mares, full sisters, Royal View Lady Isabelle, and Royal View Lady Holly and again stallion Black Park Sensation (9). Instead of field demonstrations, Bill used Belle and Holly to

transport people from the parking areas to the grounds, for both days, at a trot each time. It was estimated that in two days' time, these mares trotted over 22 miles hauling people; of course they had just finished making 1,900 square bales of hay with foals at their side.

For the Breed Parade, Shires were well represented. Todd Riedel of Trail-Light Farms presented his hitch wagon being pulled by two of his Shire mares, and Black Park Sensation pulled a Pioneer fore cart that had been converted into a training show cart. Jim Alexander, Sandra Rutter, and son Jett of Black Park Shires from Bloomfield, ON Canada attended HPD this year, and Bill was honored to have Jim drive his home bred stallion, in the Breed Parade.

HPD was back in Mt. Hope again in 2014, but by this time, Bill had sold out of his Shires in 2012, and Black Park Sensation was no longer in Ohio, so couldn't attend, but his only breeding son, bred by Bill (Royal View Sensational Thomas) owned by Royal Knight Shires made his appearance in the Breed Parade.

Then in 2015, Andrew Troyer, Bill's son decided to continue with breeding Shires, and acquired several mares, one being bred by his father, Royal View Park Bell, out of Royal View Lady Isabelle and Black Park Sensation. Andrew has been focused on acquiring and breeding Black Park Sensation mares, because of their work ethic and sound mind. He has since acquired a Canadian stallion and has been breeding and promoting the Shire breed.

In March 2021, Geryl & Missy Wade from Virginia, who originally purchased their first stallion from Bill in 2007, and also developing a long lasting friendship, carried their 3 year old stallion, Royal Knight's Supreme Prince William, "Gunner" up to Andrew for training, with hopes he would be ready to attend HPD 2021, being held in Mt. Hope. Due to his size, Andrew had plans of training Gunner with his big mare Bell and by the first week he had Gunner and Bell driving without any issues and felt Gunner would be ready by July.

Mt. Hope HPD: A Rich History of Shires

The Wade's returned to Ohio in July for HPD bringing stallion, Black Park Sensation, "Tom" who would be making his 3rd and most likely last Mt Hope HPD appearance at the age of 22 years old. Tom is well known throughout the Amish community in Ohio, so the Wade's thought it special for him to be presented at HPD. When Tom attended HPD in 2003, he was just in the beginning of producing his off-spring for Bill. By 2008, he had produced eleven registered, and by 2021, Tom had produced 28 registered, several known unregistered and an unknown number of draft crosses that many Amish are still using as buggy horses. Several people including a few Amish came by the stalls just to see how Tom looked and was doing. Tom is the only known draft horse to attend three, Mt. Hope Horse Progress Day's spanning over 18 years.

The Breed Parade at HPD is the closing finale of both evenings, with the crowd being at maximum capacity. Each breed is alotted about 10 minutes to read a bio and showcase their horses. The light and saddle horse breeds were presented first, followed by the draft breeds, and then the six horse hitches closes out the evening.

Plans were for Andrew to drive Bell (Tom's daughter) and Gunner (Tom's great grandson) and Geryl to drive Tom in the presentation, and Missy to read the Shire bio.

Before traveling up to HPD, Geryl and Andrew both were told a cart or wagon would be available for them to pull, but come time for the presentation, none were available for Tom, so Geryl had to ground drive him, and had to try to keep up and hold him back, because Tom knew once that harness goes on, it is time to go to work, and he knew what he was supposed to do. Andrew drove Bell and Gunner in a fore cart, trotting them around the ring and was impressed that Gunner did very well for his first time being out in public in front of such a large crowd.

Karla and Bill Stoner, and Vicky McCaffrey, and friend Inga Holting faithfully manned the ASHA vendor booth that Karla and Bill has also been setting up at every Mt. Hope HPD since 2008. Many folks stopped by to chat Shire, and one person took a membership application. Karla commented that "It was also very rewarding to have several people stop by the booth on Saturday to tell us how much they liked the Shires in the breed demo."

Brows Josephine "Josie"

We wanted to share the amazing life of one Shire who so touched our lives. There are many wonderful horses in the world. She was one of ours. We miss her every day.

Brows Josephine "Josie" SHS Stud Book: 146809 May 19, 1999 – July 28, 2021

Born at Brows Farm, Glasson Dock, Lancaster, UK, she did not know the journey she would take or the lives she would en-

hance. With the help of Arlin Wareing, and a representative, and vet, from the Shire Horse Society we adopted (purchased) her in July of 2000. She was transported to London for her flight to America where she met her lifelong pal Landcliff Pearl. Together they flew to JKF, and then were trucked to our farm (Eclectic Shire Farm) in far northwestern Minnesota. The first thing they did on arrival was race a lap of their paddock before Josie jumped the fence and landed on the driveway. Thankfully she immediately ran into the barn to get back into the paddock. She was always a good girl.

She was only successfully bred once, but unfortunately her daughter, Drusilla, did not survive. Nevertheless, she became a great help with Pearl's two foals, Lucy (Eclectic Diamond Lucrezia) and Gonk (Eclectic Diamond

> Algonquin), teaching them how to behave and helping them learn to drive. She was always the Cool Aunt.

While in Minnesota she learned to drive and competed in many fairs,

winning multiple classes including cart, team and tandem (with Pearl), Unicorn, and 4up and abreast (with Lucy and Gonk). She always enjoyed meeting the people who would come by her stall and offer to pet her or give her treats. She did once steal a little girl's cotton candy, right off the stick!

She also helped put up her own hay pulling a mower, rake, and a self-powered baler, and skidded logs from the forest for mom and dad to use in heating the house.

In 2012 the entire family moved to Wisconsin, where the winters were nicer, and she enjoyed that. After moving to Wisconsin Josie and Michelle tried their hand/hoof at dressage, even earning a blue ribbon, and so she became a well-mannered riding horse with the help of Kelley Shetter-Ruiz. She also carried Michelle aside.

For another challenge she tried a hoof at American Driving Society showing and really rocked. Cones were a challenge for big feet, but she did well in the ring and was super willing to please.

Josie enjoyed going to the Midwest Horse Fair and seeing the people and getting love and

biscuits. She always shined in the Demo Ring, whether leading a 4, or showing a Concours de Elegance aside. She also was very good to help train new drivers and gave many the opportunity to drive a real draft horse.

She was diagnosed with bladder cancer in early June 2021 and was immediately retired from any work and allowed to enjoy her last days with Pearl, Lucy, and Gonk in the pasture. She will be greatly missed.

Whether riding, driving, farming, logging, or just being a super sweet girl, Josie was always ready for a challenge and she always took care of her human. She did not, however, trust Garden Gnomes, who were always her nemesis.

1. My husband and I plan to attend the annual ASHA meeting. I would be willing to complete any and all tasks asked of me.

2. I want to be more involved with the association to help promote the Shire horse breed. It is my desire to fulfil the duty God has led me to and with dedication and the unique ability to offer a new perspective, I am certain I can be an asset to the Board of Directors. I humbly realize I do not have the experience and knowledge others may possess, but I am eager and willing to learn. Aside from being passionate about Shires, you will not find a better team player. I have the ability to bring people together so everyone feels welcome and included, which is vital for the association and its members, given how intimate and close-knit we are. Encouraging members, established and new, to voice their concerns or ideas is the best way to retain and grow our numbers which in return, helps our beloved Shire horses.

3. I believe the most pressing concerns are delayed registrations, finances, and lack of involvement. Folks are not registering their horses as foals, and passing the papers to the buyer which results in 10+ year old horses that have not been registered when a new buyer obtains ownership. This can create unexpected expense for the new owner, having to incur all registration and transfer fees, which the horse may have been transferred multiple times, along with the cost of paying for the animal and transport. During the 2021 annual ASHA meeting, the finances were discussed. The newsletter is something, I believe, all members look forward to receiving, but it is costly to print and ship. ASHA needs more members, we need more people getting involved with their horses and applying to become members.

4. To encourage Shire horse breeders to have their foals registered, perhaps we could send reminders to all active members before the June 1st deadline to get their papers sent in to the association. This also helps the association stay connected with its members, and keeps people involved. A way to save money, as spoken about at the meeting, would be to eliminate the newsletter and only send a digital copy to members. I do not support that notion, personally, but an alternative is to find ways to cut costs of printing and mailing. There are options out there my husband and I have inquired about, that would not sacrifice the quality of the newsletter our editor works so diligently on, but would cut costs on printing and shipping. These avenues can be explored further. Lastly, our most pressing issue is lack of involvement. Breeders failing to register their foals in a timely manner is due to lack of involvement. Financial issues are due to lack of involvement, if more people apply for membership, more income is brought into the association. If our association is inviting, welcoming, and friendly, more people will want to be a part of that. I would love to help plan more events and shows in the south, as most folks do not know what a Shire horse is, much less about our association. Events that other members attend and promote will help spread information about Shires and ASHA and hopefully, draw in more members.

I have been promoting and educating the public for over ten years about the shire thru our Carriage company. I have also helped the ASHA with its educational video in promoting the shire. Our farm only breeds, trains, and uses Shire draft horses for our public carriage rides. My major strengths are as follows: I am a team player, I have a strong background in educating the public on the breed, and I have a strong background in marketing and promoting events and companies.

3. The three most pressing issues that face the ASHA are the following:

1. Membership: we need to find a way to increase our membership and support.

2. Education: we need to educate the public on the breed and get them excited about shires and their uses and care. We have a lot of negative press going on now about working horses. If this keeps up all drafts and horses will be under pressure to not be ridden, worked, or shown.

3. Youth Program: it is important to have a good youth program and support it financially. There is no future without future generations.

4. I would suggest that we look at our membership and address the members we have lost and find a solution so that we can increase our membership. We need to listen to our members and what their needs and wants are from the ASHA, not ignore them. I would also suggest we re-vamp how we represent ourselves at national and local shows. The youth program needs to be open to any child who wishes to learn about, show, and work with shires. It needs to encourage them to want to learn about the breed. ASHA needs to sponsor or do presentations to 4-H clubs in areas where we have members with Shire barns. There is a lot of outreach we can do to promote ASHA and the breed that I feel we have not done currently or in the past. By promoting the shire, it will ensure that the breed is bred to breed standards, and that the public is supportive to protecting and raising shires for generations to come.

1. If elected I will take this responsibility equally as seriously as the other commitments in my life and work cooperatively with others to complete tasks.

2. Serving as an ASHA board of directors is an opportunity to contribute to the continuation of the Shire horse and support owners. I can contribute a historical perspective to our discussions, both on the evolution of the Shire and the governing associations, after having helped Arlin Wareing research and edit his book on the development of the Shire. At this point I have an extensive reference library. My parents bought their first Shires in 1970 and began a breeding program to support their own 6-horse hitch as well as selling horses that went all over the US. At one point we had as many as thirty Shires on my dad's dairy farm in Coupeville, WA and it has always been a family commitment to care for them. I can contribute the practical experience of having raised generations of Shires, registering and selling them, as well as showing them in a variety of venues. I have experience serving on a variety of different boards and governing bodies as both a member and leader. I believe in discussion as a means of exploring ideas and am quick to quash comments that are off-topic or too personal. Every voice is import-

ant and part of the job of an elected person is to listen and then represent those ideas.

3. The ASHA is a governing body that represents Shire owners as well as oversees the stud book. I am concerned that over the years that role has become muddied and become less transparent due to a lack of communication. People new to the Shire breed need more readily accessible resources to find out the history of the Shire as well as best practices in care and breeding. The ASHA stud book has a great deal of missing information that make it difficult to trace a specific bloodline and monitor genetic diseases. For example, we now have the capacity to begin monitoring genetic diseases like Chronic Progressive Lymphedema and have the potential to eradicate it through careful breeding practices.

4. The ASHA board of directors should be publishing not only the minutes of meetings, but recording those meetings digitally and posting them on the website. There should also be a short synopsis of each that can be scanned quickly. This needs to be a consistent tool to increase transparency in not only decision making, but in the issues that are being addressed in the first place. There should be a digital forum hosted through the association website to post questions, articles, pictures and trade advice. Too often Shire breeders are given strategies and commercial products intended for light horses or that have only been proved effective with Belgians. We need a place to pool our collective experiences. The stud book is a long-term project that should be addressed from both ends of the timeline simultaneously. The current registration process can be enhanced with reasonable genetic testing while at the same time filling in the historical blanks. There are sets of bound studbooks that pre-date 1960, but much of that information has not been included in the current digital version.

 - 1. Numerous resources from past experience with ASHA and Shires as well as other equine and non-equine endeavors.
 - 2. Open to new and different ideas to better promote the breed and support the membership as we go forward.
 - 3. Willingness to work with people to achieve common goals to promote and improve the ASHA and the breed.
- 3. 1. Membership & registration numbers how to support and increase and how to find people willing to do the work of the association.
 - 2. Identify new/different ways to promote the breed.
 - 3. Updates to existing ASHA rules and regulations.
- 4. 1. Consider a survey to all current and 'recent former' members to identify concerns and request ideas to address those concerns. The last large scale membership survey was done in 2007 via surface mail. Current electronic survey options would be much more cost effective and greatly simplify the process and evaluation of responses.

2. Expand promotional activities throughout the country with horse fairs, etc., but especially in the on line presence to reach a wider audience, including overseas options.

3. ASHA's by laws were last thoroughly revised in the mid 1990's. A number of specific revisions have been make over the years, as needs arose, but the document needs a more in depth review and revision to bring it up to date and make it more 'user friendly' for both board members and the membership. Review by a legal entity experienced in equine matters and these types of document should be included. Committee specific rules should also be reviewed and updated where needed.

FALL BROODMARE EXAMS

The breeding season is over on most Quarter Horse farms by the middle of the summer and is completely finished by September. It is understandable that many owners and breeders want to take a break from broodmare work when the season is over. However, mares should not be completely ignored during the late summer and fall months.

It is common practice to examine mares initially 14 to 16 days after breeding for an early pregnancy diagnosis and then reexamine mares periodically until they are 50 to 60 days in foal. These examinations in early pregnancy are prudent because most cases of pregnancy loss occur in the first 60 days of gestation.

A follow-up examination in the late summer or early fall, at approximately 5 months of gestation, is recommended to determine if mares are still in foal or if the pregnancy has been lost. Mares previously determined to be pregnant that are found to be open on the 5 month recheck can be examined further to determine if a cause for the pregnancy loss can be identified. The examination may include a review of the breeding history, a thorough physical evaluation, palpation and ultrasound examination of the entire reproductive tract, speculum examination of the vaginal vault and cervix, collection of culture and cytology specimens from the uterus and possibly a uterine biopsy. The goal is to identify reproductive problems that may be associated with reduced fertility or a decreased ability to carry a foal to term and correct the issue as soon as possible and not wait until the next breeding season. For example, if a uterine infection is detected, prompt treatment should be initiated which administration, infusion of antibiotics into the uterus, and possibly a Caslick's procedure to reduce the risk of recontamination in mares with poor perineal conformation.

Pregnant mares should be housed separately from other horses on the farm, including non-pregnant mares, geldings and show/performance horses, to limit the potential for exposure to infectious diseases that may cause abortion. The infectious agent that has the highest risk for causing abortion in mares is equine herpesvirus type 1 (EHV-1) also known as rhinopneumonitis. There are two killed-virus vaccines available commercially approved for use in healthy mares as an aid in the prevention of abortion due to EHV-1. These are Pneumabort-K[®], produced by Fort Dodge Animal Health, and Prodigy[®], produced by Intervet, Inc. Pregnant mares are at greatest risk of abortion if exposed to EHV-1 in the second half of gestation. As a consequence, it is recommended that pregnant mares vaccinated against EHV-1 at 5, 7 and 9 months of gestation.

Mares that are determined to be open in the late summer/fall examination can be housed under lights beginning in December to stimulate early follicular development and advance the date of the first ovulation of the year. Mares maintained under natural light conditions in geographical areas where distinct seasonal climate changes exist stop cycling during the winter months. The first ovulation of the year will occur in these mares, on average, in late April or early May.

Open mares exposed to 15 or 16 hours of light and allowed 8 to 9 hours of darkness beginning in early December will start cycling in early to mid February. Mares can be housed outside during the day and brought into a barn or paddock in the late afternoon. Automatic timers are an efficient and effective way to control the duration of light exposure. The timers can be set to go on an hour before dusk and shut off at 10:00 or 11:00 at night.

On many farms, the pregnancy status of mares is not rechecked between the 50 day pregnancy examination and the following spring. Even then, a mare may not be evaluated unless it is felt that she is not as big as she should be or is not bagging up. It is a fact of life that some mares are not going to carry their foal to term. It will be too late to use lights to stimulate an early onset of cyclicity in an open mare if the pregnancy status is not determined until the spring.

Confirmation of pregnancy status in the fall will allow for the early identification of open mares and give owners an opportunity to make appropriate management decisions for each mare.
