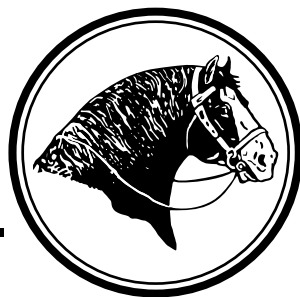

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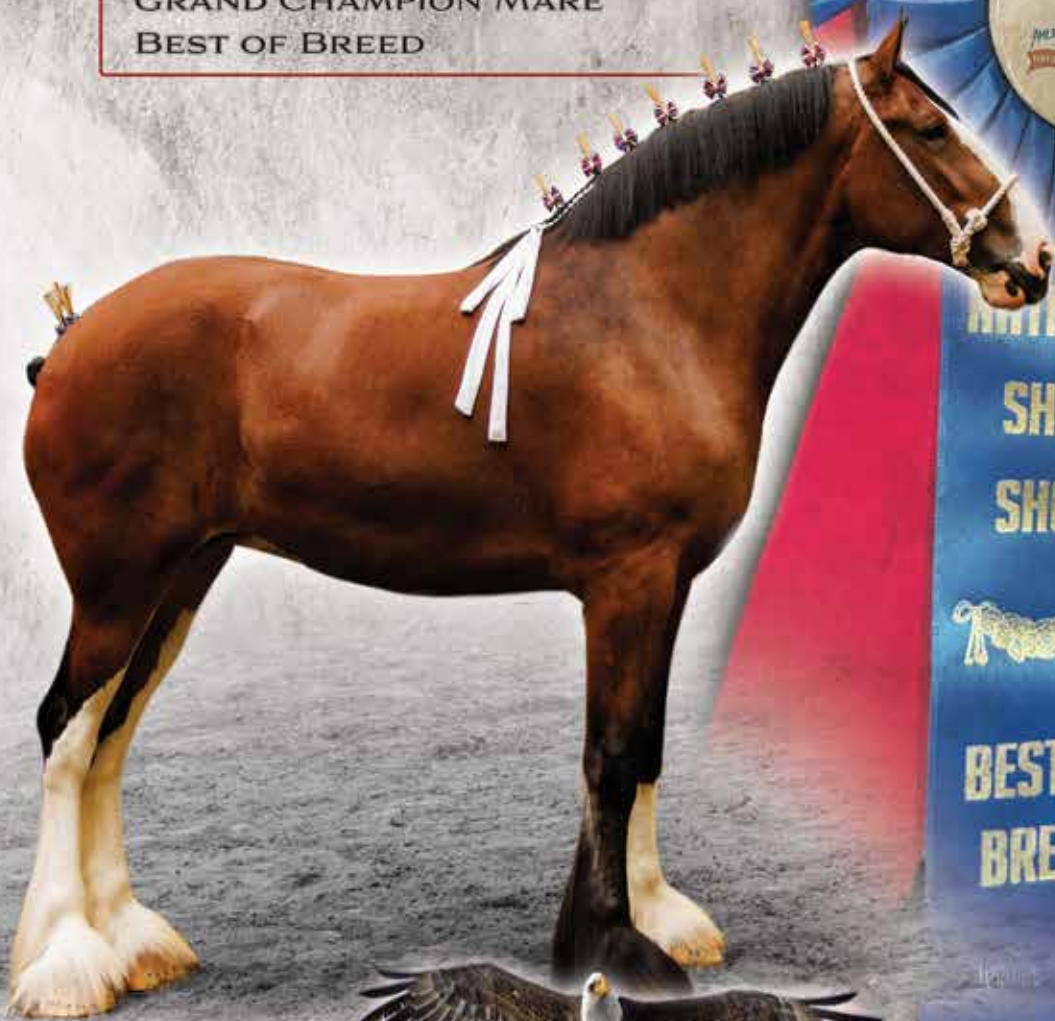

GOODBYE TO A FRIEND

Louise Sandra Reuble, 76, ended her fight with ovarian cancer on July 28, 2022. Her parents, Hilding and Esther Sager, eventually settled in Mukilteo, WA and Louise graduated from Cascade Senior High School in 1964, then went on to earn an Associate of Arts and Science degree from Everett Junior College in 1966. She earned a Bachelor of Science in Home Economics from Washington State University in 1968 and did a fifth year in Early Childhood Development at Western Washington University in 1976.

Louise began her teaching career in Home Economics at Oak Harbor High School, located in Oak Harbor, WA on Whidbey Island, in 1968. One of her students introduced her to a local dairy farmer, Lawrence Oxle Reuble, who romanced her with evening horseback rides and taught her to drive his hitch of ponies. When they married in 1970 the couple took a pick-up truck and trailer on their honeymoon to the Calgary Stampede as they went in search of Clydesdales. Lawrence, who had farmed with draft horses while he was growing up, dreamed of having a six-horse hitch of drafts and Louise thought that was a fine idea.

They came home with an empty trailer, but a few months later Louise was in Ellensburg, WA for a teaching conference and happened to see the Anderson Family Shires in a field. She stopped and introduced herself to Mel and Dorothy, fell in love with the Shire breed, and the next trip was to Blackfoot, Idaho. Lawrence and Louise purchased two bred mares from Alma Chaffin and a two-year-old stud from Vernon Bird. I assisted them in making that first purchase and it started a friendship that has lasted over 50 years.

Lawrence and Louise consistently bred and sold registered Shires to all corners of the US and Canada as they developed and maintained their six-horse hitch. They participated in numerous shows, fairs and parades along the west coast under the farm name *Four L Shires*. Their son, Lawrence Hilding, was born in 1972 and their daughter, Leandra Louise, was born in 1974.

Louise's knowledge and teaching ability made her one of the top promoters of the Shire breed. She was elected to the American Shire Horse Association's Board of Directors in 1974 for a six-year term. In 1976 the Board of Directors found themselves in turmoil with seeming no sense of direction for the future. Louise helped organize and hosted a Board of Directors gathering at her home in Coupeville. She prepared a Baked Salmon dinner that I still remember vividly. Louise used her classroom skills to provide a calming atmosphere that created a positive working environment that was vital. This meeting and three others, including another back in Coupeville, provided the foundation for the ASHA to the present time. The Mission Statement for the Association was her idea, she presented it to the Board and it was adopted by the membership, and it is still followed today. She also helped write the breed standards that were adopted into the ASHA bylaws. In 2000, Louise served another four-year term on the board.

Louise was always surrounded by teenagers, including my own children when they were that age, encouraging their involvement with the Shires and taking them to various events. For several years the hitch was sponsored by Coca Cola and the company had a wooden “six pack” designed to fit in the back of the wagon for the Seattle Sonics cheerleaders, *the Sea Gals*, while Coach Lennie Wilkens rode on the seat with Lawrence. Louise always walked in front of the hitch during parades and sometimes it seemed the horses were following her more than they were being driven by Lawrence.

In addition to teaching, farming, raising Shires and kids, Louise also did a two-year fellowship with the Washington State Ag Forestry Foundation in the early 80’s, traveling all over the US to study and be an ambassador for farming and forestry. Her group also did a three-week trip to China before the country had really opened up to outside visitors. Lawrence died of lymphatic cancer in 1989, but Louise continued to raise and show horses with her two teenagers while she continued her teaching career.

In 1999 Louise began a class sponsored by the National Restaurant Association to teach advanced culinary skills to teenagers, including providing a competition called the ProStart Invitational. Louise’s students dominated at the state level until her retirement, earning numerous Student of the Year awards, taking first place in both restaurant management and culinary arts, and consistently finishing in the top rankings nationally. She always joked she cooked like a farm wife so worked with industry professionals to advance her own skills, even training for two weeks with a group of chefs in Lyon, France. In 2010 her culinary arts team placed second in the nation, competing against states famous for their hospitality industries like Nevada, California and Florida. Louise was also named ProStart Teacher of the Year in 2003 and was Teacher of the Year in her school district in 2006. She retired from teaching in 2011 to enjoy her horses, sewing, knitting, cooking and time with friends and family.

Louise had arthritis in a hip and knee that limited her mobility in the last few years, but she never lost her love for the Shires and promoting the breed. Her mind was active and strong and she was thinking about ways to advance the Shire breed even in the last weeks of her life.

Louise leaves behind a legacy of people who were better for having known her, a tradition of Shire breeding excellence and generations of kids who she helped become adults. She will be missed.

SHIRE LITERATURE REVIEW

In an effort to assist Arlin Wareing in his upcoming book on the history of the Shire, I have amassed a pretty extensive library of my own, as well as quite a few historical artifacts. My intention is to share more titles in each Newsletter, but Arlin's book will have a complete list of references. Eventually we may publish a literature review but in the meantime we're willing to share titles and authors to help support your own exploration. Enjoy the read!

The fall is one of the busiest times of the year as the show and fair season winds to a close and it's time to get everything put away for winter so the book I am suggesting is an easy read that might even have a few helpful tips. Fair warning, Keith Chivers is next on the list, but his book has such heft that I think we'll split it between winter and spring. In the meantime, *The Shire Horse in Peace and War* by J. Albert Frost was written in 1915 and has been reprinted multiple times so it is fairly easy to find a copy on Amazon or Ebay.

In his preface Frost mentions that England has been at war for about six months, referring to World War I, and that likely explains the title. The Shire Horse Society had been formed 37 years earlier and draft horses were still in heavy demand not only as farm animals, but also to pull freight and in the train yards. Shires, along with other horse breeds, were shipped to the continent by the hundreds to serve in the war and most never came home, but it was still early days when this book was published.

Frost gives practical advice on the care and maintenance of Shires as well as discussing how to start a breeding operation and current events on the show circuit. He also spends some time on the history of the breed, quoting Gilbey repeatedly, and is another example of the limited access to information even the best researcher had. It is an interesting lead into the more extensive and detailed history provided by Chivers.

A Shire should be trained from "foalhood" so that it is ready for the harness, according to Frost, because leaving it to the age of three is much riskier. "The breaking in of this class of colt takes time and strength, while the task of getting a halter on is no light one, and the whole business of lungeing, handling, and harnessing requires more brute force and courage than the docile animal trained in infancy calls for." (page 28) That's an understatement if I've ever read one!

Feeding a yearling cost 10 shillings a week, about 70 cents, Shires ranged from 75 pounds to over a thousand depending on gender and bloodlines, and stud fees ran anywhere from a pound for an available "mongrel" to a few hundred pounds for a champion stud. There was a healthy export industry that included sending Shires to Russia, Argentina, Canada, Germany, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and of course the largest number of buyers were in the United States.

Frost lists prominent horses of the time, breeders, gives a peek at the extensive Shire show circuit. "Both horse and man want to practice the performance in the home paddock a good many times before perfection can be reached, and certainly a little time thus spent is better than making a bad show when the critical moment arrives that they are both called out to exhibit themselves before a crowd of critics." (page 49)

This book is a little over a hundred pages, the language is very accessible and while much of the content is still relevant today, it provides a window into a country at war and the impact on the Shire breed. Many of the horses and breeders Frost references

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have formed the foundation of the breed and continue to impact modern bloodlines. If you'd like to read more about the use of horses in World War I, Simon Butler's book *The War Horses: The Tragic Fate of a Million Horses Sacrificed in the First World War*, is very good but some of the photographs are hard to absorb.

Previously recommended:

The Old English War-Horse was written in 1888 and a revised second edition was published in 1889 after more scholarship under the titles *The Great Horse* or *The War Horse: From the time of the Roman Invasion till its development into the Shire Horse* by Sir Walter Gilbey.

The History of The Shire Horse and the Origin of the English Cart Horse Society by Frederic Street, originally published in 1883 and widely available through Amazon and eBay as a 2018 reprint.

In the 1980's Clark and June Jenson from Blair, NE were raising Belgian draft horses, having a modest herd of 12 mares and a stallion. But it was in the 1990's when son Dean and wife Sue were traveling and stopped to watch a draft horse show, when a majestic Shire hitch trotted in. Dean and Sue were awestruck with their beauty, and in no time, several Shire foals and yearlings made their way to the Jenson farm. Clark made the hard decision to sell his Belgian beauties to focus on raising the ever fading breed of Shires.

Finding quality Shires was no easy task back then, as the number of Shires in America was slim. This led Clark and June to make many trips to England in search of the quality bloodlines they desired for their breeding program. They imported many stallions over the years, and this has led to the strong breeding program that encompasses Jenson Shires today.

Jenson Shires has an average of 50-70 breeding mares and stands 5-6 stallions in any given year. This has led them into developing an extensive reproductive program, offering AI, and collecting/freezing semen into building an extensive semen base. They collect and freeze semen on all of their stallions, as well as ship out cooled semen during the breeding season.

Colton (14) and Mahony (13) Jenson are two of three siblings belonging to Drew Jenson and Tracy Jenson. They are Grandchildren to Dean and Great-Grandchildren to Clark and June.

Recently Colton and Mahony attended the 2022 Draft Horse Youth & Novice Congress, sponsored by the Midwest Draft Horse Enthusiasts of Wisconsin at the Dane County Fair, where they both learned many skills dealing with draft horses; both kids love working with the Shires and helping out on the farm.

FIRST TIME AT THE NATIONAL

What it was like to be a first-time participant at the National Shire Horse Show.

I have been to many state fairs and farm shows in my lifetime. I was raised with large animals working on a dairy farm and riding horses, but this was the first time I had ever actually been involved with showing animals. I was invited to the Iowa State Fair to help my friend, whom I have helped her at her farm on a few occasions, so I only kind of knew what I was getting myself into. These are my thoughts as a first-time participant and outsider of the Shire horse community.

It is the hardest that I have worked in a long time. I have a very strong work ethic and I am one of those weirdos that really enjoys manual labor, which is probably why I was invited! At home I am a highly active person, pretty much moving from sunup to sundown. But the work and the hours that went into caring for the horses and preparing them for showing is a longer and harder day than I have worked in several years. I learned so much doing this one event, and my braiding skills came in handy.

Having worked in farming before, the everyday care was no surprise. But this was beyond everyday care. First, the load in: everything gets unloaded, stalls are prepped for horses, stalls are set up with tack and feed, a stall is set up as a kitchen, and stalls are set up for sleeping. I was impressed by the accommodations that are put in place by all the farms. Many years of fine-tuning and learned-lessons are on display at load in and set up. In the evening the community comes together for a dinner. No egos on display, just camaraderie and talking shop. I was welcomed in and treated like just one of the group.

Now to the actual show: Saturday night, ponies were washed and combed, and plans were made for Sunday's show. Sunday morning was putting the last-minute touches on the set-up, walking ponies, picking stalls, and feeding. Then the fun begins! We prepped for Ladies Cart and Stallion Cart, and it's awesome to see what goes into getting a horse show ready. Forelocks and tails were braided, manes were rolled, and the flowers stood straight up! The people driving and heading the carts were like Superman: they disappeared and "poof" reappeared show ready! Off to the arena they went! Horses, carts, and people on display! Judging was done, ribbons were given, and off to the barn they went. Everything was undone, horses were fed, stalls were picked, and show prep was done for the next day.

Monday was where the action happened! Up before dawn, coffee started (it was desperately needed), and then a repeat of pony care. But somewhere around 7 am, I looked around and 10 people had descended on 8 horses. They were all out in cross ties, everyone working on different parts of the horses. Direction was given by those with more show experience, but everyone was working. Buzzing around like bees in the hive. Looking at my watch...it was almost show time... I thought there was no way we were going to make it! Bustling around, putting on the finishing touches, changing into show clothes, and off to the arena we went—and on time no less! We were all holding horses: as one category would come off, the next would go out! Horses would go out and into the arena like the ebb and flow of an ocean tide. From my view, it was an amazing display of teamwork. The group I was with were 3 small farms working together to show their horses. Everyone helped each other, and no one complained...too loudly. Halter classes were done by early afternoon, and I was already tired, but the day was not nearly done. We had a few hours to "rest" and regroup. On deck for the evening were more cart and the hitching classes.



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That evening I got to witness the beauty and class shown by this community; I was truly impressed by the sportsmanship and willingness to help others. I had seen a brief glimpse of it on Sunday evening when a stallion in cart had reared up, and when he came down his leg was on the outside of the cart rail. The driver was stopped and all the individuals that were free in the arena went to help correct the cart. Similarly, on Monday, a cart entering the staging area flipped on its side, and everyone descended on the horse to allow the driver to move to safety and unhook the horse so that neither the horse nor any humans were hurt. Everyone pitched in to help the driver hook back up and make it into the arena. This is rare to come by in any kind of competition and I feel blessed to have witnessed it. After the mare cart, we were all back in our staging area helping Alder Shires prepare for the 2-horse hitch. My friend was on top of the wagon giving directions to the 2 people helping put the horses in the hitch. Out of nowhere someone from the Belgium community jumps in to show them how to hook it all up. He had nothing to gain by providing help and he could have just watched, but he didn't. He helped us finish up the hitch, wished us luck, and then was off to whatever he was doing prior to jumping in and offering his assistance.

My overall experience was great! I made new friends, learned a lot, and was able to witness teamwork, camaraderie, and sportsmanship. By Tuesday Morning when I left for home, I was tired, bruised, and my feet hurt.

But I was happy, fulfilled and looking forward to doing it again. I want to thank LaMon Norton from Alder Shires for cooking all weekend and keeping us fed on more than junk food, and all the people that came to help from Alder Shires and High Line Farms. Lastly, I would like to offer a special thanks to my dear friend for inviting me along and putting me through trial by fire of showing horses. I can't wait for next year!



NEWSLETTER'S FUTURE

In order for an organization to have a membership newsletter, members need to send in articles, information, and photos for that newsletter, especially to keep it fun, interesting, and educational. But, like the majority of organizations across our great nation, only a handful of members actively participate, and our association is no exception.

Our newsletter is the main communication and historical document that our members can enjoy. When I started as editor, many asked for the Registrations & Transfers to be added back in, and where to find a listing of breeders, so a free Breeder's Listing for members was also added.

Our newsletter contains our normal business information, ads, and show information, etc. but as editor, I must find content to fill the other pages. Being your editor for the past 5 years, I have been relying on our members to provide this content, and have always tried to do my very best to be fair and include all articles and as many pictures in the newsletter that members would send me, sometimes I had room to include them, sometimes I could not. I would try not to promote any one farm, member, or horse over any others, including my own. This has been getting harder to do, as lately there seems to be only a few members that consistently send me pictures and articles, and by including these articles and or pictures, it seems that I am promoting members, horses, and farms more than others, and that is not my intent, but I need content to fill the empty pages.

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Ever since I have been a member, the printing and postage to mail the newsletter has been the most expensive line item in the Association's budget. The BOD has tried to figure out how to reduce these costs over the years, while still keeping the newsletter viable. When I took over as your editor, I met with the bulk mail manager at the post office and he was able to show me how we could save money by mailing our newsletter at the non-profit bulk rate, versus the first class rate but with faster delivery, by uploading our member addresses and the post office software providing the barcodes to print the labels. By printing these labels without errors, the cost to mail was dramatically reduced and the post office waived the yearly non-profit bulk fee.

We now live in a digital world and with costs of everything on the rise, at the 2022 Annual Board of Directors Meeting, the BOD voted to reduce the number of ASHA Newsletters down to two per year, instead of the four per year that members have enjoyed since the newsletter's conception. Kind of like when the combustible engine replaced horses, everything is progressing more toward digital. Whether you like it or not, there are just some things we have no control of, like wanting to keep that flip phone that will soon be obsolete.

Not many people like changes, but the world is changing, and our association is trying to keep up with those changes. Unfortunately, going digital costs money, someone has to be paid to maintain the digital program for registering, storing, and keeping track of our horses and studbook; to write and monitor the programs protecting our personal information, hoping that there is not someone else out there smarter that can hack that program and steal our personal information, and all the other costs associated with digital technology. It is members that run our association, volunteering because of our love for the Shire, but as I have gotten older, I find that there just is not enough time in the day to do everything that needs to be done. Yes, there are members that may be able to write programs to register and keep track of our horses, and write a program to have an updated website, but these volunteers get tired, things change in their lives, and they have to move on. By paying for our digital services from a reputable company that does these things as their business, it keeps continuity, and allows more time for member/volunteers to spend promoting our Shire.

The updating and upgrading of the ASHA website is just another way that our association is trying to keep abreast of the ever changing technology. This large endeavor has begun and should be completed and go live by December. While the DigitalHorses program is working, doing a good job for us, it does have flaws, but again it costs money to make big changes in technology.

When the BOD voted to reduce the newsletter to two per year, they did not provide information of what these newsletters should contain. They were thinking about trying to pattern what the Percheron and Clydesdale groups publish. These publications are beautiful full color *Draft Horse Journal* style magazines, full of breeder advertisements. Because of the small size of our membership, it is going to require almost all of our breeders to advertise to support this type of publication. A thicker publication will cost more on postage, because the magazine will be too thick to run through the postal scanners. I encourage everyone to call a BOD member to express your concerns or to give them some ideas or guidance of what you as a member would like to see in our publication.

Over the past 5 years, my life, like many others has gotten even busier. With having way too many Shires, including 6 breeding stallions, we have trained to collect and freeze semen, and learned how to get our difficult mares pregnant and perform our own ultrasounds, but have had limited time to do. Normal life, running a farm making your hay, along with full time jobs allows very little time for much else, but I always allotted my volunteer time to put together your newsletter, because I felt it was an important member benefit. When I reluctantly agreed to accept Newsletter Editor 18 issues ago, I had decided then that if I received complaints I would no longer serve as your newsletter editor. That time has come, so ending with the Winter 2022 Newsletter, I humbly resign as your editor to allow someone with new fresher ideas to serve you. I'm not mad at, or quitting the association, just time to step back for a breather. I hope you have enjoyed the newsletters over the past years and I THANK YOU for allowing me to have served as your editor.

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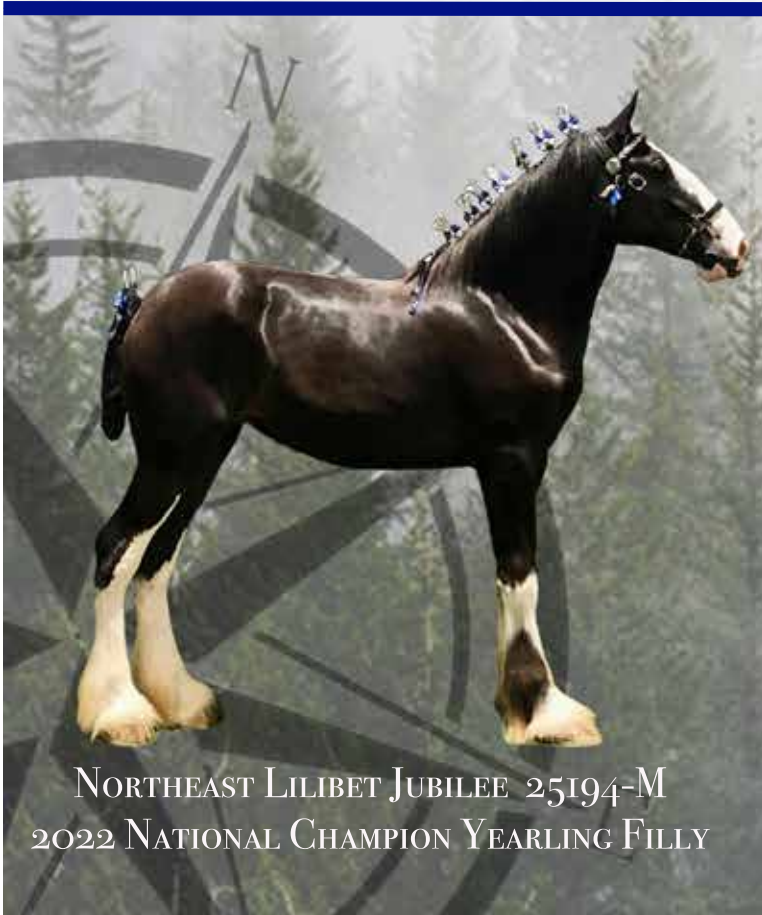
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
