


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




PROCEDURAL GUIDELINES FOR NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS TO THE ASHA BOARD OF DIRECTORS The Nominating Committee may solicit volunteers to become candidates for the Board.

Members wishing to run must contact a committee member IN WRITING by USPS or by e-mail by July 21.

By August 1, all candidates will receive a short form requesting the following information: Name, address, phone number, and e-mail address. A statement of ability and commitment to attend membership and board meetings and do committee work should they be elected. A brief statement of strengths and contributions candidates can bring to the board (200 words max) the forms shall be completed and returned to the Chair postmarked or emailed no later than August 20. Forms postmarked or emailed after August 20 will not be considered. The Chair will then notify all committee members, board members, and the ASHA Recording Secretary of the final slate by September 10. The ballot shall be sent to all eligible voting members, as defined by the By-Laws, no later than October 31, Any paper ballots postmarked after the deadline date will not be counted. The results must not be released to anyone else until December 21 or until all of the above have been notified, whichever comes first. The new board members shall be announced via email, website and in the winter hulletin

Horses Can't Fly! But the Best Shires "Float"

(with words of wisdom passed on from the legendary judge, the late Allan Bexon)

All horses perform their duties in contact with the earth. Everything we ask a draft horse to do involves contact with the ground surface and a transfer of muscular energy into the ground which results in a forward motion.

Draft horses do not work at a run, but they are "athletes". Their form determines how well they perform and whether they can work with less chance of lameness. Despite being heavy and muscular, the best Shires are very fluid and athletic in their motion.

The paramount importance of a draft horse staying sound should be obvious to all breeders. The best breeders understand that conformation faults and poor conformation creates a predisposition to lameness. So a good understanding of correct conformation is critical to anyone who hopes to breed top quality Shires.

The importance of correct conformation and leg action is magnified in draft breeds due to body weight. The forces that draft horses can exert when pulling can be astonishing and place tremendous strain on their anatomy. As such, draft horse breeders need to be particularly diligent when selecting mares and deciding which stallion to use.

The following is intended to articulate a few key conformational characteristics and types of movement that will help as a guide to evaluating our own breeding stock. It is intended to help us understand where there is room for improvement and why.

Since all horses work from the ground up, this article will focus on the lower half of a Shire.

If there were a "First Commandment" for all horse breeders it should be "No Foot, No Horse". There is abundant literature on the importance of a good wide deep foot on draft horses, but that is critically important in draft horses.

Another adept saying is "Foot, leg, feather...tops may come but bottom's never". If your colt or filly has poor legs, do not expect them to grow out of it, unless it is a windswept condition.

The harsh repetitive impact of a Shire's foot on the ground demands a conformation that will act as a shock absorber to avoid lameness. Long well sloping pasterns with flexibility in both pastern joints and fetlocks are key characteristics to good shock absorption and good fluid movement in any breed. Width and depth of the hoof is essential.

In terms of an ideal leg action for a Shire, I am thankful for the guidance of my late friend and mentor Allan Bexon. He was born into Shires in England and emigrated to Canada. His knowledge of horse conformation and movement became and remains legendary amongst breeders from all draft breeds. Now with my 40 years of Shire breeding I appreciate Mr. Bexon's wisdom and guidance more and more over time. The truth in his words becomes more evident as we gain experience in draft horse breeding and assessment. Our long conversations with Mr. Bexon graciously answering my endless questions will remain a treasured memory. Any day in which I was able to spend time with Mr. Bexon was Christmas morning to me. His council and opinions I hold with reverent appreciation.

For the good of the Shire breed, I feel that it is more important now than ever that I relay many aspects of his teaching. My hope is that I too pass his wisdom on in a manner in which he would approve. What follows is just a few key highlights from Mr. Bexon's teachings. Had he been a writer, I am sure he could have written volumes. There has been abundant literature on what constitutes correct equine conformation. Unfortunately, less has been written about what we breeders should look for in the leg motions of a Shire, which will in turn educate us as to what may be good or bad about a certain horses confirmation. The objective in this article is to primarily describe the leg motion desired and correlate that back to a desired conformation.

Mr. Bexon's assertion that a draft horse cannot have too much "quality bone". That refers to flat cannons as opposed to round cannons. Horses being tied-in below the knee is now a commonly ignored fault. There is abundant literature on "quality flat bone" in Shires, so there is no need to dwell on that.

Sharp clean hocks are a widely accepted essential, so I will take the liberty of moving on from that as well. Please do keep in

mind though that this is of paramount importance.

"A draft horse should walk with authority", Mr. Bexon would often say. We should see the horse planting each foot in turn very solidly on the ground, much like large suction cups attaching to the earth. The hoof should slam down hard without twisting, or sliding. Naturally the heel is the first point of contact. Twisting or sliding upon impact with the ground is an excellent indicator that the conformation is not correct. A quality draft horse will lift their hooves highly and distinctly, more so on the front. Try closing your eyes and just listening to the best shire specimens as they walk past on hard ground. You can hear the quality.

Both front and rear hooves should be picked up and move straight forward before striking the ground. There should be no swing of the hoof to the outside or inside. I recall him saying he likes high flashy knee action but it should be free of paddling out or winging in of the hooves. Paddling out or winging in is a fault sadly overlooked by many modern judges.

Mr Bexon stressed that when watching a Shire move away from us, we should see the bottoms of their feet, which indicates a good flex in the pastern and fetlock joints. He liked a horse that picked up his rear hooves as opposed to many who seem to shuffle low to the ground on the rear. From the side we should witness a smooth fluid rolling action of all the joints with an obvious suppleness in the joints. The best horses will almost seem to float effortlessly along at a trot. Like any good athlete they make it look easy. Enjoy that beauty!

Also when a Shire is travelling away from us, we should see the hocks move straight back and forward, with a minimal amount of movement to the left or right. The description is like a couple pistons on a crankshaft. A fault all too common in Shires today is "wobbily hocks", which are more easily seen at a trot. Mr. Bexon did not like to see the hind hooves twist as they hit the ground, which happens when the hock motion is poor. Watch how a horse walks from behind in muddy conditions and you will see how poor rear leg conformation will cause them to slip and struggle to gain footing more than a well conformed horse. That is a clue to the additional stress and strain caused by that poor conformation. Observe and learn!

High hocks and long forearms are contributors to good action as stressed by Mr. Bexon. Cow hocks and sickle hocks are serious faults to be avoided.

As they push into the collar, the vast majority of a horses power is generated by the hind quarters. As such Mr. Bexon was very critical of horses with too much slope at the croop ('goose rump"). Sadly, that today is a fault that is all too common in the Shire breed.

Shire and Clydesdale breeders have come to universally accept that the hocks should be very close together. At draft horse clinics (why don't we have clinics any more?) He would say " if a Shire or Clyde shits on one hock he should rub it off with the other." I personally do like to see the hocks on a Shire close together and the cannon bones parallel and vertical. However, Mr. Bexon also said often that we breeders tend to push a good thing too far. Late in his life I heard him say he came to believe that both Shire and Clyde breeders had "pushed a good thing too far" in terms of the closeness of the hocks. My interpretation of that today is that if everything else is right, we should not be overly critical of a Shire who's hocks are not almost touching.

The "flat-footed walk" was a favorite topic of our conversations. He would stress to me that "all draft horses should have a good flat footed walk." That is their natural working gate. The public loves to see the big hitches trot magnificently around the show ring, as do I. However as Mr. Bexon pointed out, we are breeding draft horses, who when truly worked it is done at a walk, with a minimal of trotting. When evaluating the conformation and movement, Mr. Bexon stressed the importance of viewing the horse walking from the side. Judges in Great Britain commonly do that with the horses being walked in a circle with the Judge in the middle. North American judges only view a few steps of walking from the rear and front angles only and the majority is at the trot with a minimal amount at the walk. For the good of the breed, for Shire halter classes, I wish the judges were required to adopt something much closer to the British system. When watching hitch classes, you can time the length of the "walk your horses" period at most shows and you will be surprised to see it is often only 8-12 seconds before they call for the hitches to trot. That I believe is very unfortunate. A harness horse that will maintain a sensible flat-footed walk with, and a sense of jittery pricing is a useful horse. That is particularly important with a good lady's cart horse. Take pleasure in seeing them walk!

There is no contradiction in saying "the best horses float" and "the best horses walk with authority". In the best of draft horses the both happen with an athletic and fluid ease of movement of each leg in motion the instant before

the hoof is planted solidly on the ground. That smooth supple action should not be confused with the high knee action that and rolling hock action that Mr. Bexon relished in his descriptions. Most of us Shire breeders love to see high pretty knee action but that should not be considered an essential, whereas we should always look to see supple athletic movement of the pastern and hock joints as described above. Short pasterns and upright pastern and shoulder slopes are killers of good athletic movement. Long forearms and high hocks are contributors as well. Of foremost importance is the flexibility of the fetlock and pastern joints and correct alignment of the bones and joints.

Stepping into the present, it seems that many new breeders are so fascinated by the "wow" factor of height or color that few breeders are really taking the time to study how their own horses are moving. As such they have very little idea what they need to improve in their herd. Another barrier to breed improvement is breeders with a poor knowledge of conformation mentoring new breeders, which results in the "blind leading the blind". That problem has become an increasing barrier to overall breed improvement. You can reverse that trend.

If you are new to Shires or pride yourself in being a Shire breeder, then please educate yourself in the skeletal structure of the horse. Become a student of the anatomical function of the tendons, ligaments and muscles necessary to achieve correct movement and maintain soundness.

I hope this article prompts a greater focus and understanding of what to look for in terms of the movement of our Shires with a goal of better breeding decisions and overall breed improvement. I also hope this article prompts breeders and those interested in becoming breeders to seek a greater level of knowledge on the issues mentioned in this article.

Seeing a well conformed Shire trot from the side it will seem as if they float along in athletic grace is a vision to treasure.

Your Shires will never fly, but with the right breeding decisions you'll witness with pride them float on feather in majestic powerful authority.



Shire Horse History In America


Chapter 11

Please note: This work is an excerpt from a larger book with earlier installments in previous newsletters and is to be taken as the opinion of the author.

By the 1940's Fred Bixby had become one of the last major Shire breeders in the US. A short ten years later the breed was virtually gone, but because Bixby had registered his animals and many were sold for further breeding after his death, those bloodlines endure today. He bred for a heavy bodied horse that moved well, had a minimum of feather, was athletic and intelligent. To coin a phrase, the breed became known as "Bixby Shires" and without his efforts the breed would likely have become extinct.

I cannot tell you the number of times I have heard people refer to the Shires here in America as 'Native Type Shires,' and they were different than the 'English Type Shires.' Even members of the American Shire Horse Association Board of Directors have promoted those terms over the years. At some point, it shifted to Work Type and Show Type, implying that some Shires were bred strictly for show and had lost the capacity for real work. These distinctions are misleading and inaccurate because what they are really trying to identify is the body type descended from the Bixby Shires versus the lighter body type of Shires imported from England beginning in the 1960's.

A very small number of Shires still existed in Southeast Idaho after World War II. Mr. C.J. Wright from Blackfoot, Idaho was a small

breeder at one time, and knew of Fred Bixby. In 1947 he took his family on a vacation to California, giving him the opportunity to meet the person he had heard so much about. As a result of that meeting, he purchased 16 Shires. One stallion, Sunny J (ASHA 21885), sired by Juneau (ASHA 21622), was in turn sired by Moore's Lindy (ASHA 20611) who we discussed in the last chapter. Sunny J's dam was of Blackhawk breeding. Clarence Grant from Idaho Falls, Idaho bought the horse from Wright, and kept him until his death.

Years later, Wright told me the story of his meeting with Fred. He also told me of seeing a stallion in a double fenced corral. When asked about the horse he was told the horse was so mean that if he got through one fence, he would still have another before getting out. It was also used to keep people from getting too near the horse and being hurt. Wright asked why, with all the horses there, this one was kept when they had to go to such length. It seems Fred liked his conformation, but more important was the fact his offspring all had a determined spirit for hard work. I cannot verify that story, nor do I know the name of the horse, but I have always wondered if the horse was Juneau. This spirit and determination seemed to be dominant in many

of the Bixby horses that came to Idaho.


In an effort to settle Fred's estate after his death, it was determined the majority of the horses would be sold even if it meant

they went to slaughter. To save as many as possible, Elizabeth Bixby Janeway, one of Fred's daughters, remembered hearing about the purchase six years before. She remembered the buyer had been from Blackfoot, Idaho, but did not know his name. Thinking he may be willing to buy more, she set out to find this person. Instead, locals put her in contact with Mr. Alma Chaffin, in Blackfoot, who was a cattle and horse dealer. Alma was interested in the prospect of buying some, and said he had a friend who may also be interested, by the name of Vernon Bird. Vernon had a small farm he ran with Shires, he also ran his father- in-law's farm, which was just over the fence neighboring my father's farm. Vernon also showed a six horse hitch at various shows, parades and other events in the area.

The two men traveled to California in 1953 and years later Alma related the events of that meeting to me. I don't think I was ever told where they met, but I always thought it was at the ranch in Santa Barbara. I'm unsure of the prices, but I think Alma said they were told by Elizabeth they could have their pick of any Shire in the group for \$125.00 a head. Vernon chose four young black mares with white blazed face and white legs and Alma picked six more.

Alma asked if he could pick ten more for \$25.00 less, which was agreed upon. He then asked to pick ten more for \$25.00 less than those, which was also approved. Altogether they purchased 30 horses, mostly mares, and then bought three stallions.

Larry (ASHA 21985) was black with a white blaze, white legs, and was sired by Juneau. They also purchased a stud called F.H.B. (ASHA 21948) who was a buckskin with a white blaze and three white legs; his sire was Juneau as well. He was also line bred on the dam's side to Moore's Lindy.

I don't know the third stallion or anything about him. I'm sure it wasn't planned, but these two and Sunny J were all sired by Juneau so the breeding of that horse is still visible in Southeastern Idaho. Vernon kept Larry until he died of old age. F.H.B. was sold to Earl Malm, and he later went to Donald Anderson in Burlington, Washington. The third stallion was sold to Lyman Arave, a cattle rancher in Salmon, Idaho. That stud may have then gone to the Marble Ranch in Nevada in 1956; there doesn't appear to be any registered offspring from him.

It seems the three cattle semi-trucks sent to California to pick up the Shires made a lasting impression on those who were there at the time. It also represented the end of a great era. The remaining horses were sent to auction. While the number is unknown, eight railroad stock cars were needed to transport the remainder of

the herd. None of the Bixby family was happy to see them go; no one went with them or attended the sale so there is no written record of the Shires. Two of Fred's daughters, Elizabeth Janeway and Deborah Green, kept an eight-horse hitch to honor their

father's memory. It was shown on exhibition and Deborah's youngest son, Jeffery Green, remembers helping as a teenager. The hitch was retired in 1959 when Deborah passed away.

Along with Fred Wientraub and Alex Rose, I was privileged to meet Elizabeth and her husband Edgar at their ranch in 1977. It was great to hear stories about Shire history firsthand. Sister, as Elizabeth was commonly known, stayed interested and supportive of the Shire breed until her death in 1993. She was one of the original Board of Directors

and signers of the revitalized American Shire Horse Association in 1965. I met Jeffery Green, Deborah's son, in 2005 and he also told me some of the history of his grandfather; he is now the Chairman of the Los Alamitos Foundation Board of Directors. He and the staff at Long Beach have been a big help in putting the Bixby story together and it is much appreciated.



Prebiotics and Probiotics for Horses

Dr Tania Cubitt & Dr Stephen Duren Performance Horse Nutrition

Horses have a unique digestive system. The front portion of the digestive system, the stomach and small intestine, utilizes enzyme digestion to break down food material. The back portion of the digestive system, the cecum and colon, have a microbial population (bacteria, yeast, fungi) that ferment and breakdown fiber. Without micro-organisms in the hindgut, horses would not be able to digest and utilize plant material such as hay and pasture. These microbes in the hindgut break down and ferment fiber, producing volatile fatty acids that serve as a significant energy source. During this fermentation of plant fiber microbes also synthesize B vitamins and other nutrients essential to the health and wellbeing of the horse. In order to efficiently digest fiber, the microbial population of the hindgut must be healthy and their numbers at appropriate levels. There are additives that can be added to feed or used as supplements that may assist in keeping the microbes in the hindgut healthy and primed for proper digestion.

Probiotics

The term "Probiotic" is opposite to "Antibiotic". An antibiotic is a product that will actually kill or destroy certain bacteria. A probiotic is an organism thought to be beneficial to the host organism. According to the currently adopted definition by the food and agricultural organization, probiotics are: "Live microorganisms which when administered in adequate amounts confer a health benefit on the host". In this case, the host can be either bacteria within the digestive tract or the horse. Bacteria such as *Lactobacillus acidophilus*, *Enterococcus* or *Streptococcus faecium* are the most common types of microbes used as probiotics in horses; but certain yeasts are also used. dac® utilizes Yea-Sacc1026® made by Alltech, which is a live yeast culture based on *Saccharomyces cerevisiae* strain 1026, a yeast strain specifically selected for its influence on animal performance. Another common term used for probiotics is direct fed microbials (DFM).

Many horse owners use supplements or commercial feeds containing some or all of these microorganisms with the purpose of keeping the hindgut microbial population stabilized. Any stress such as an abrupt change in feed, the stress of putting a horse in a trailer and taking him somewhere, a visit by the veterinarian or farrier, a strenuous showing or work schedule, can disrupt the gut. A high-grain, high-concentrate, low-fiber diet may also damage or destroy microbes in the hindgut.

Small amounts of these important probiotics added to the diet on a daily basis may be beneficial, as there are a myriad of things that can stress horses. It's easy to change the gut microbes very quickly; the life cycle of some of the microbes is as short as 15 minutes. Thus it's a good idea to include them in the ration. It's an inexpensive insurance policy.

Research on Yea-Sacc1026° supplemented in horses has shown increased fiber digestion and phosphorus digestion. This led to further studies showing increased whither heights in foals from dams supplemented with Yea-Sacc1026° throughout gestation.

Since these are living organisms, the question often comes up about shelf life of the products, and whether the microbes actually make it to the hindgut when fed— can they withstand the digestive process through the first part of the digestive tract or withstand the temperatures involved in feed processing? dac® has carefully selected specific probiotics such as Yea-Sacc1026® because of its ability to withstand feed processing temperatures. Prebiotics

Prebiotics are non-digestible food ingredients that stimulate the growth or activity of bacteria in the digestive system. Most (but not all) prebiotics are carbohydrates— long chains of sugar molecules bound together. Common examples of prebiotics include fructooligosaccharides (FOS), xylooligosaccharides (XOS), polydextrose, mannooligosaccharides (MOS), and galactooligosaccharides (GOS).

MOS is a non-digestible sugar that has the same binding site on its surface as the small intestine. 

Aged horses can have diminished intestinal function or other conditions that make it difficult for them to digest and absorb their food. dac® has recognized these weaknesses, and have included Yea-Sacc1026® and Bio-Mos® in their supplements designed for young and aged horses.



Other scenarios where use for these products may be important is re-establishing proper gut function after the horse has been ill, off feed, or treated with oral antibiotics that killed some of the beneficial microbes in the hindgut. In Memorium

Fryeburg, ME – Kathleen Ann (Boucher) Hathaway, 56, of Fryeburg, Maine, passed away peacefully in the presence of her three children and partner at her home in the early morning on Saturday April 3rd, 2021 after a 3 ½ year battle with cancer. To her last days, Kathleen was stoic in her fight and often told her loved ones that even if she did not win her battle, she hoped other cancer patients would benefit from the things learned from her experiences.

Born October 25th, 1964, in Biddeford, Maine, she was the daughter of Jacques Jean Armand Boucher and Shirley Ann (Larouche) Robichaud and step-parents Phillip Michael Robichaud and Donna (Fish) Boucher. Kathleen was self-employed, and spent her whole life dedicated to her passion of raising Shetland Sheepdogs (Shelties) and Shire Draft Horses. Kathleen had a love of animals from her youth, dressing the family Cocker Spaniel up in a dress and pushing it up and down Stacy Street in Saco, Maine in a stroller. Kathleen got her first Sheltie "Dougie" from Linda Clark at 16 years old after working with Linda for

two years and learning the craft. Dougie's show name, "Doug Henning Master of Illusion," was the impetus for the name of her eventual farm, Illusion Farms. Kathleen has left a legacy in the canine world as her Shelties have been sold throughout the country, with some finding homes as far away as Singapore. Kathleen eventually expanded to larger animals, buying her first Shire "Dakota" from Jeremy Howell of Blackfoot, Idaho in the 80's. At the height, Illusion Farms was one of the largest, most successful, breeders of Shire horses in North America. More importantly, Kathleen's real legacy in the Shire world is her dedication to the improvement and preservation of the Shire Breed, as their conservation status is considered "at risk".
